**CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

The second semester of a two-semester course covering trauma emergencies, triage, multi-casualty control, patient transportation, crisis management and interagency cooperation are stressed. Includes the lecture and laboratory elements required for State of Maryland Emergency Medical Technician and National Registry of Emergency Medical Technician certification course sequence.

**RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:**

In re-evaluating the program and determining the course numbers for the new EMT-Basic course sequence it has been determined that it would be best to make this a 200 level course. Our target student population has always been freshman and sophomores for the Emergency Health Services Degree. By making this a 200 level course it would give students who transfer in from a community college, and have taken the course there, the ability to have the course accepted as transfer credits. Only for historical significance has the course maintained its 300 level course designation.

There would be no adverse affects to the EHS Paramedic or Management track students in completing their 45 upper level credit requirement due to the amount of courses the students already take at that level.
